#### KINGSBRIDGE AND DODBROOKE.

KINGSBRIDGE is a small town and parish in the extreme south of Devon, about 5 miles north from the sub-port and harbour of Salcombe and from the English Channel; it has a terminal railway station, and is the head of a union and county court district, in the Totnes division of the county, hundred of Stanborough, petty sessional division of Stanborough and Coleridge, rural deanery of Woodleigh, archdeaconry of Totnes and diocese of Exeter. The town, which is the market centre for a large district, is 20 miles east-south-east from Plymouth, 12 south-south-west from Totnes, 15 south-west from Dartmouth, 20 south-west from Torquay, and 2313 from London.

In 1888 an Act of Parliament for making the railway from South Brent to Kingsbridge and Salcombe, which had been previously obtained by private promoters, was transferred to the Great Western railway, and this line was opened in 1893 as far as Kingsbridge.

By an Order of the Devon County Council, which was confirmed by Local Government Board Order 29,274, and came into operation March 25, 1893, the parishes of Kingsbridge and Dodbrooke were united for civil purposes

By Local Government Board Order No. 29,275, which came into operation on March 4, 1893, the two parishes had already been constituted an Urban District. By an Order of the Devon County Council, dated May 17, 1893, the name of the Urban District of Kingsbridge and Dodbrooke was altered to Kingsbridge.

The united parish is now governed, under the provisions of the Local Government Act, 1894 (56 and 57 Viel. c. 73), by an Urban District Council of 12 members.

By Local Government Board Order No. 34.675, which came into operation June 25, 1806, parts of the civil parish of West Alvington and Churchstow were added to the civil parish of Kingsbridge and Dodbrooke and Urban District of Kingsbridge.

The town stands on rising ground at the extremity of a long and irregular creek, broken up on either side by numerous inlets; the passage is navigable for sbips of from 200 to 500 tons burthen, and at the foot of the town there is ample quavage for the import and export of merchandise of all descriptions.

The town consists for the most part of a single street, about half a mile in length and 60 feet wide; it is well paved, lighted with gas by a limited company, and plentifully supplied with fresh water from a spring rising at Combe Royal.

The public property of the town, the value of which is considerable, is principally vested in feoffees, and the proceeds are assigned to various purposes by the votes of the ratepayers in vestry assembled; the present annual income amounts to about \$500, and on the expiration of existing leases will probably exceed \$600.

The church of St. Edmund, King and Martyr, near the centre of the town, is a cruciform building of stone, erected previous to the year 1310, chiefly in the Early English and Perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, transepts, north and south-west porches and a central tower with spire, containing 8 bells, rehung in 1877; the aisles were added in the 15th century, forming chapels on either side of the chancel: in both aisles are hagioscopes: the chancel retains a piscina and a fine ancient stall seat or miserere: about 1889 the reredos of Caen stone was restored and decorated in gold

and colour by the Rev. James Henning, Duncombe lecturer, who also designed the baptistery, which contains the children's window: the large and ancient font of Polyphant stone is Early English; the walls immediately near it are panelled in oak, ornamented with decorative work of Early English design, and a quotation from the Te Deum, the whole being enclosed by wrought iron screen work, also from designs by the Rev. J. Henning: in the south transept are remains of Early English work: the piscinæ of two chapels remain: the English work: the piscinæ of two chapels remain: the 15th century parclose screens separating the chancel from the chapels contain rich tracery: the doors and lower panels were removed to make choir pews, but some good specimens of scroll pattern panels are still left: of the rood screen, also a work of the 15th century, the only remains consist of ten of the lower panels, incorporated in the pulpit and prayer desk: the south-west porch is of the early part of the 15th century, and has a water stoup constructed out of Early English has a water stoup constructed out of Early English window tracery: the stained east window was presented by John Miller and Tryphena Toby: there is a memorial window erected in 1873 by Thomas Harris esq. to his parents; and in the baptistery the "Children's window," so called from the fact that the cost was chiefly subscribed for and collected by the Sunday school children of St. Edmund's; two other stained windows have been presented respectively by Mrs. Birks and Mr. and Miss Nicholls: in the north aisle is a window in memory of Mr. John Ellis a former churchwarden: the window of Mr. John Ellis, a former churchwarden: the window of the north chapel contains the arms of the Earls of Devon, the only fragment of ancient stained glass now remaining: the only old window of the church is in the south chapel, and, as well as the ironwork protecting it outside, belongs to the roth century: in the south porch the old parish stocks are still preserved: the church was restored in 1860, and again in 1884-91, and since 1896 the whole church has been re-floored. choir stalls placed under the tower, a chapel formed on the south side of the chancel, and a screen presented by Mrs. Birks; the south gallery has also been removed, and a new porch built: the old choir vestry has been converted into a library for the clergy of the deanery, and the church has been reseated in oak the whole work being carried out under the direction of Mr. Ralph Nevill F.S.A. of London, and Mr. T. W. Latham, architect, of Kingsbridge: in 1913 a screen was placed in the north aisle and the organ was enlarged and rebuilt at a cost of £600. The earliest register, that of baptisms, is dated 1603; the rest date from 1754, and are in good preservation. The living is a vicarage, annexed to that of Churchstow, joint net yearly value £300, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Exeter, and held since 1921 by the Rev. Richard Sydney Davies M.A. of Worcester College, Oxford, and chaplain to Kingsbridge union. William Duncombe, by will dated 1691, founded a lectureship in connection with the parish church of the present yearly value of £120, with residence, and held since 1921 by the Rev. Henry Thomas Stealey M.A. of Durham.

The Baptist chapel, in Fore street, founded in 1640, was rebuilt in 1708, enlarged in 1852, and restored in 1899, and will seat 350 persons.

The Congregational chapel, in Fore street, was founded in 1667; the new chapel, erected in 1858, was renovated throughout in 1891 at a cost of over £300, and has sittings for 500 persons.

The Wesleyan chapel, in Fore street, was erected in 1814 and enlarged and improved in 1870, and has sittings

for 400 persons.

The Brethren's chapel, in Fore street, was erected in 1853; it is a building of stone with a colonnade before the principal entrance; the chapel stands back from the street, from which it is separated by a lawn: there are 300 sittings.

A Burial Board of 9 members was established in December, 1865. The cemetery, consisting of one acre and containing 2 mortuary chapels, was formed in 1874; it is situated at Highhouse Point, 1 mile south from Kingsbridge, on the Charleton road, in the parish of Dedhard. Dodbrooke.

The Town Hall, built in 1850 by a joint-stock company, at a cost of about £1,500, will hold 600 persons: the clock was erected in 1875. It is now the property of the feoffees, and is used for the benefit of the town. A police station and other institutions are in this building, and the county court and petty sessions are also held in it.

There is an iron foundry, a brewery, a large roller

flour mill and implement works.

The Shambles, belonging to the lord of the manor, and used by local shopkeepers, are in Fore street, under the

east end of the church, and were first erected about 1586; five of the granite pillars which support the building were in their present position at that date, and three others were added later; the rooms are used as offices

by the owner.

By a charter of Henry VI. dated 16 Sept. market for the sale of general produce is held every Saturday and first and third Wednesday in the month, and under the same charter a large cattle and pleasure fair is held on the Thursday after the 19th July in every year, being on or near to the festival of St. Margaret, Virgin and Martyr, and extends to the end of the week.

The Kingsbridge and District Horticultural Society hold two shows annually in August and November.

St. Edmund's Hall, near the top of Duncombe street, formerly called the Oddfellows' Hall, a fine building of stone and brick, erected at a cost of £1,000, will seat 300 persons: the hall is used for the Church Sunday school and parochial and other meetings. In 1896 the basement was fitted out as a gymnasium and bagatelle

The Fire Brigade station, in Fore street, is a building of stone, erected by the feoffees, and affords room for two fire engines: the upper storey contains a large room used for parochial and Urban District Council meetings.

The Masonic Lodge "Duncombe No. 1,486," was consecrated on the 16th April, 1874: the lodge meetings are held monthly at the Masonic Temple in Duncombe street, on the Monday nearest the full moon.

The Girls' Friendly Society and Mothers' Union has a branch here, formed in 1885: meetings are held fortsightly for members for your conductation in the

nightly for members, for work and recreation: it is under the management of ladies residing in the town and district.

The principal hotels are the King's Arms and the Albion.

Two local newspapers, "The Kingsbridge Gazette" and "The Kingsbridge Observer and South Devon

Times," are published weekly.

The Kingsbridge and District Cottage Hospital, in

Duncombe street, opened in 1898 and extended in 1918, contains 15 beds and 2 cots.

There are several charitable societies supported by

voluntary contributions. The Acland charity of about the church porch. The Cornworthy charity of growth at the church porch. The Cornworthy charity of £1 is distributed annually to 20 poor persons. The grave of Mrs. Tryphena Toby, and the east window in St. Edmund's church, are kept in repair by money, amounting to £13 yearly, left by her, any surplus being given to the poor.

The manor of Kingsbridge is the property of Mrs. John S. Hurrell. A manorial court is held every two years, at which a portreeve is appointed.

The area of the parish of Kingsbridge and Dodbrooke is 1,046 acres of land, 17 of tidal water and 83 of fore-shore; rateable value, £13,052; population in 1891, 2,888; in 1901, 3,025, and in 1911, 3,049, including 92 inmates and 6 officers in the Poor Law Institution.

DODBROOKE is an ancient market town, so closely connected with Kingsbridge that their boundaries are very indistinctly defined; they were in 1893 amalgamated for civil purposes, and included within the jurisdiction of one Urban District Council; the streets of the two places run into each other, and such divisions as exist are more brooklets partly covered in. Many as exist are mere brooklets partly covered in. Many residences have been built in recent years on the Quay, but there are very few tradesmen's shops as compared with Kingsbridge, a great number of the houses being the abodes of artizans. The inhabitants draw their supplies mainly from Kingsbridge, and most of the resi-dents have their employment there. The public pro-perty of the town is vested in feoffees, and the disposition of the proceeds rests with "the ratepayers in vestry assembled;" the present annual income amounts to £130, and on the expiration of existing leases will probably exceed £270. The church of St. Thomas à Becket, standing at the north end of the town, is an edifice of stone in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles and an embattled western tower, with piunacles, containing 6 bells; the tower was formerly surmounted by a spire, removed in 1785: the analysis of the spire. erry surmounted by a spire, removed in 1785: the ancient and beautifully carved oak screen of the 15th century was restored in 1897 by Mr. Harry Hems, of Exeter, as a memorial to J. P. Margary esq. of Stoke Damarel: the church was partially restored in 1846, and again restored in 1878-86, at a cost of £2,200, when the chancel was rebuilt, and a north aisle added, divided from

the chancel and nave by an arcade of six arches, three of | which were taken from the ruins of the now disused church of South Huish: the ceiling of the south aisle was removed, exposing the oak roof, which is enriched with carving and bosses: the church was also reseated, and the font, an interesting work and the sole relic of the original building, re-erected on a base of Dartmoor granite: several windows of the new north aisle are stained, the west window in this aisle, formerly in South Pool church, being fitted with stained glass by the Duncombe Lodge of Freemasons: the stained east window, the gift of Capt Strickland, of Dawlish, was dedicated by Bishop Knight Bruce in 1896: the organ was enlarged during the years 1889-93 and 1897 at a cost of about £700, and subsequently completed, at a cost of over £1,000, and enclosed in a new carved oak case given by the lord of the manor: new clergy and choir vestries have also been added: the Welle chapel, on the south side, the property of the rectors, has been converted by them into a lady chapel: in 1899 the oak screen was continued across the north chancel aisle, at the expense of Mr. Peter Bond: in 1900 marble steps, the gift of Mr. Tucker, were placed in the Sacrarium, and elaborately carved dwarf oak screens, given by Mrs. Lewis, placed at their head: the west window has been filled with stained glass, and also a window in the north aisle in memory of Mrs. Ingles: there are 500 sittings. The earliest existing parish register dates from the year 1725, many ancient documents and registers having perished in a fire at Langwell House about 1830. The living is a ancient documents and registers having perished in a fire at Langwell House about 1830. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £310, with 14 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Exeter, and held since 1915 by the Rev. Douglas Hilton Briggs M.A. of St. John's College, Oxford. The rectory house was enlarged in 1897. The United Methodist chapel, erected in 1897 will see the present. The Kingshvidge and in 1867, will seat 250 persons. The Kingsbridge and

South Hams Constitutional club, established in June, 1887, occupies premises near the Quay. The building, which includes reading, billiards, smoking and writing rooms, was opened on the 6th January, 1888. Dodbrooke is famous for "white ale," a beverage compounded of malt, hops and flour, and fermented with an ingredient called "grout," which is manufactured in this neighbourhood only: the manufacture was at one time so large that the rector levied a tithe on it; tradition assigns the introduction of this peculiar beverage into the district to the surgeon of a German regiment, which was at one time quartered here. regiment which was at one time quartered here. Citrons and oranges are grown here to a large size. There are agricultural implement works, and several commercial wharves. By a charter of Hen. III. dated 7 Jan. 1256-7, an important cattle market is held on the first and third Wednesday in every month, and is attended by large numbers of butchers and agriculturists; an open square near the centre of the town, culturists; an open square near the centre of the town, called Market Cross, is devoted to the purposes of this market. Under the same charter the king granted a two-days fair, to be held on the vigil and festival of St. Mary Magdalene, July 21 and 22. John Walcot M.D. better known as "Peter Pindar," the celebrated lyric and satirical poet of George III.'s reign, was born at Dodbrooke in 1738, and educated at Kingsbridge; his residence, called "Pindar Lodge," still remains; he died in Somers town, London, 14 January, 1819. Alexander Ball Crispin esq. is lord of the manor. Dodhrooke Manor is the property and residence of Major brooke Manor is the property and residence of Major Henry Robert Stapleton Cotton. Welle House, an ancient residence of the Champernowne family, of which a fine gateway still remains, is the property of Mr. Trist and residence of Robert A. Powell esq.
